

The good news is that during 2018, the Fund awarded 46 grants to a number of Developing Countries at a cost of €269,400, somewhat less than last year.

The chart alongside shows how this was distributed where it will be noted education took priority. Clean water such as rain water harvesting, bore holes and similar are also high on the priority list. The provision of solar power is increasingly being requested in the developing world, particularly for schools and hospitals. A member of the CSTWF Advisory Committee was struck by the amount of conversion to solar power taking place while on holiday in Tanzania. They also saw a number of new start up companies providing solar technology to local communities, and the Fund can expect an ongoing increase in requests for solar power into the future. As always, health continues to pose many problems for these countries where many health centres lack basic medical equipment, especially in the area of maternity services. Often there are no such services at all and infant and mother fatalities at birth can unfortunately be quite common. The Fund will always try hard to support all of the many requests for help received each year. No amount of pictures or words can illustrate these hardships. The reality is that the generous gift of money is the most important game changer to improve their lives.

Perhaps the bad news for the Fund is the falling contribution base. Sadly many needy and worthwhile projects could not be funded during 2018 because of lack of funds. The Management Committee is already attempting to redress this through dialogue with the Official side. Increased and better contact with the Fund's stakeholders is to be undertaken. In particular, the Fund needs to

ensure that new entrants are given ample opportunity to join, and retiring members are provided with a seamless transfer to their




